TRAINING

Squib loads are frequently seen in competitive shooting. They can be extremely dangerous, so we need to be aware of the potential each time we make ready to shoot. So, what is a squib and what causes them. A squib round is a round fired that does not have enough force behind it to exit the barrel. What makes them dangerous is not that round it is the next round

fired that has nowhere to go giving the weapon the potential to catastrophically fail. Either a weak weapon will burst the barrel, or a stronger one will just pile up projectiles one behind the other, usually damaging the barrel beyond repair.

Everyone probably has recalled instances where squibs are detected. I had a friend who I won't mention by his real name but let's call him wood chuck since he shoots my stage props, a lot. He was shooting a PCC and the chamber gasses were coming back toward him, nothing coming out the other end an yet his finger still kept touching the trigger. Looks



like about 6 times stacked up in the barrel. Needless to say, it was ruined. Luckily it was a well-built gun and did not explode.

So, what do we do when a potential squib is noticed. Unlike my friend, STOP. Empty the chamber and rod the barrel to determine if there is a projectile in there. In shooting sports, we reload most of our own ammunition. We are human and make mistakes. We miss a powder charge and pop there is enough power from the primer to get the bullet out of the cartridge but not down the barrel. The next round could be dangerous. Many people remember the actor Brandon Lee was killed on the set of The Crow. What they don't know it was a squib round left in the gun from a previous shot and the dummy round forced the squib out that hit and fatally wounded him. Be careful out there. Have fun but be safe.
